Owl Class visit to the Abu Bakr Islamic Centre

"On Wednesday afternoon Owl class went to the Mosque. We all travelled on the bus from Purley. When we got there we all had to wait under the shelter because it was pouring with rain. We met the Imam who took us inside. We all had to take off our shoes and put them in a special place. We were then taken to the prayer room. The 1:30pm prayer was going on and there were about sixty men in the room praying. The women were in a different room.

After we had watched the prayer we were taken to the room where they have their special Friday prayers. There was a minbar in there which has steps, and the prophet sits at the top. We saw the Quran and the Imam recited some from memory. Aqsa also recited the first chapter in Arabic. We then went into the school room where the Imam told us the alphabet in Arabic (it has 28 letters). He told us that the oldest person that attends the school is 68 and the youngest is 4.

We also went into a room where they eat together at Eid and after sunset at Ramadan. We then had apple juice, crisps and a biscuit. Then it was time to leave.
