This Week in Collective Worship...

This week the school has been thinking about the value of "respect".

Thursday's Collective Worship was all about how respect is shown to God through worship, and the meaning of objects and actions in our sacred spaces. We looked at the strange objects that were used in the Bible's first worship sanctuary, the Tabernacle of Moses in the wilderness — seven-branched lamp stands, golden tables of bread, altars of incense and the mysterious Ark of the Covenant, and then we thought about the objects in our church today — the cross, the Bible, the altar, the candles and the Holy Communion cup and plate, and how these help us to connect to God with an attitude of awe and respect, and remind us that we can draw close to God because of Jesus' loving sacrifice. *Revd Jones*
