What is Relationships and Sex Education?

RSE is about the emotional, social and cultural development of pupils and involves learning about relationships, sexual health, sexuality, healthy lifestyles, diversity and personal identity.

It involves a combination of sharing information, and exploring issues and values.

Teaching Relationships and Sex Education at Purley C of E Primary

At Purley the aims are to reflect the school's Christian values and encourage:

Respect for self

Respect for others

Responsibility for their own actions

Responsibility for their family, friends, schools and wider community.

Teaching Relationships and Sex Education in a church school...

Church of England schools offer a community where everyone is a person known and loved by God, supported to know their intrinsic value.

....Christian message of love, joy and the celebration of our humanity without exception or exclusion

What has changed?

Relationship and Health and Sex Education becomes a statutory part of the curriculum from 2020.

Why make changes?






Primary sex education will focus on:

Preparing boys and girls for the changes that adolescence brings.

How a baby is conceived and born.

It is still not compulsory to teach sex education in primary schools... it remains a recommendation.

However it is compulsory to teach the elements of sex education contained in the science curriculum.



Parental rights.

Parents can withdraw their children from aspects of sex education however the science and PSHE curriculum is compulsory



RSE teaching

RSE is usually taught by class teachers in mixed gender groups.

Occasionally topics are covered in single sex groups.

Appropriate and experienced or knowledgable visitors from outside school may be invited to contribute to the delivery of RSE in school. e.g. NSPCC

How RSE is taught...

RSE may be taught in all curriculum areas including PSHE- Personal, Social and Health Education.

At Purley the main content is taught in PSHE.

Biological aspects of RSE are taught within the science curriculum.






Science Curriculum

In Foundation stage children will learn about the concept of male and female and about young animals.

Key Stage 1

That animals, including humans, feed, move, grow and use senses and reproduce.

That humans and animals can produce offspring and these grow into adults.



Key Stage 2

Life processes including nutrition, growth and reproduction. The main stages of human life cycle, including the physical changes that take place at puberty, why they happen and how to manage them.




RSE topics

Including that others' families either in school or in the wider world sometimes look different to their own family, but that they should respect those differences and know that other children's families are also characterised by love and care.


