

Headteacher's Update




I know that most of you will be able to recite Humpty Dumpty but can you recite eight different Nursery Rhymes?

Hedgehog class

The focus of our learning this week a has been inspired by the traditional tale of The Little Red Hen. We talked about how the characters in the story



had behaved and then we all joined in with baking some delicious bread rolls. We retold the story using actions for the different characters, and we created story maps of the steps the little red hen went through to make her loaf of bread. In maths we have been using natural resources and things we found around the classroom to continue and create repeating patterns - printing patterns with fruit and vegetables turned out to be a fun, but messy activity! We also found out how God shared the Ten Commandments with Moses, and we thought about how we can follow them in our day to day lives. Our younger hedgehogs also shared the story of The Gingerbread Man and carried out an experiment to find out what happens to gingerbread when it goes into water!

Badger class

Badger class have been enjoying poetry this week and looking at how poems are presented and written. We discussed how rhythm and rhyme work well in poetry and how adjectives and alliteration can also be very effective. We started by creating our own class rap about pirates and had fun performing it in a variety of different ways. For inspiration we watched the rapper Stormzy perform "Blinded by your Grace" and the children were amazed to find out how he started writing raps at the age of 11. We then had a go at writing our own poems or raps about pirates and have entered a national competition. The children were very proud of their work and who knows, maybe a future Stormzy or poet is currently in Badger class! In music this week we have continued to work on rhythm and pulse and we used the glockenspiels and percussion instruments to perform together and accompany a rock piece of music. In maths Y1 have been ordering numbers, largest to smallest, smallest to largest and using ordinal language. Y2 have also been comparing numbers using the inequality signs and ordering numbers up to 100. Over the course of the term, we have been plotting features onto a class treasure map in the hope of winning the treasure. Congratulations goes to Theo, whose grid reference was the winner. We finished our busy week listening to the story "Bloom" by Anne Booth. We reflected on how kind words, actions and thoughts are remembered for a long time and make us bloom and feel good. We shared our thoughts on what we would like to bloom into and what makes us bloom. For our reflection area we created some beautiful "Blooming" art work.

recall about owls. They have published some amazing fact sheets detailing all that they know. The children will be explaining their findings in a Dragon's Den style presentation next week. This term the children have really enjoyed Tag rugby and football in PE and we have some great team players in both sports within the class.

I am hoping that after half term we will be meeting via google meet, with our partner school based in Florida, for some collaborative projects.

We are all very excited about our owl walk, fingers crossed we see or hear one!

WOW- What an amazing week we have had here in Falcon Class! Our studies of Kensuke's Kingdom have led us to writing couplet poems based on



Michael's experience of being washed overboard. We explored how to use figurative language and have used a dog motif to gather ideas together. "The howling wind slapped his face like a devilish fist," from Percy demonstrates this well. All the poems will be gathered into a class anthology, so we can look at them all year and also share with others. Our coding lessons have been working towards making a game with a timer and scoring capability and it has been super to see all our programmers busily creating! The children's Great Wave art is



looking amazing and we have considered how to improve our watercolour skills for the future. Meanwhile, in French we have pulled together all our learning about reading and decoding new vocabularv to create our own French book: Boucle d'or et les trois ours! Verv impressive indeed.
