Governor's Update - January 2022

We were delighted not only with the outcome of the Ofsted Inspection reported in last week's Newsletter but with the many comments in the various sections of the report which recognised the commitment of all involved with the school. In the full report (on

the school website) the inspectors provide information on how they have come to their view, which included the responses they received from their interactions with the pupils.

At our regular Full Governing Body meetings we receive and review many reports from the Head and her staff on the activities and progress of the pupils, and these include the views of the pupils themselves in Pupil Voice reports. One of these this term was a Pupil Voice report on the pupils view of the library at the school and from it we could see that the library was very much alive and an important resource and part of the school. The pupils from all classes were keen to explain what type of books they enjoyed reading and it was interesting to see that pupils took out both fiction and non-fiction, and the varying range of topics that were popular. They showed that they demonstrated care with the books and tried to make sure that they returned them undamaged and complete so that the next pupil could enjoy them. There were many suggestions for some ways in which the library space could be changed to make it better and these will be discussed with staff and the school librarians as part of a system of ongoing improvement. The school would like to thank parents for their many contributions to the library, not only in the Wish List scheme, which will be relaunched again soon, but for the practical support with items such as the poetry box.

Badger class have been inventing different weather machines this week. The have shown creativity in their ideas

and then wrote clear instructions on how to use their particular weather machine. We had snow makers, rainbow machines, hailstone blasters, summer machines and wild, windy blowers to mention but a few! Their instructions were fun to read and they remembered a lot about the features of instructional writing from the work we did last week. We gathered data as a class to see which form of weather was our favourite and then using purple mash, we entered the data into pictogram. As part of our Geography learning we have been looking at aerial photographs and identifying the human and physical features that we could see. Some went onto look at Google Earth which they found fascinating. In maths Y1 have been subtracting by counting back and finding the difference between 2 numbers. Y2 have been subtracting a 1-digit number from a 2digit number crossing over 10.

Exciting news arrived into class this week our balloon was found and it had travelled over to Tilehurst, near Little Heath School. Not as far as last

time, I know, but we were very pleased to know that it had been found.

minotaur and focusing on our descriptive tools (noun phrases, similes, personification) as well as using our brackets for parenthesis. In Science, we looked at how the evidence base regarding geocentric Vs Heliocentric views of the universe built up over time. We met key scientists and thinkers such as Aristotle, Galileo and Newton! Year 6 have had a busy week with practise tests for the SATs, they have showed great resilience and I'm proud of them for 'having a go'. The results of the tests are really helpful for me for future planning. Thank you also to the children for bringing in their Fraction Games for the homework task, we have had fun playing them! The last piece of Falcon homework is the planets task - we already have a beautiful model planet in school to start us off.
