In fact, if you have any skills you think you can offer, we would be grateful. Sometimes we restrict volunteers from working with their own children, it depends on the child and the activity.

Information for parents and carers on COVID-19 vaccination for at risk 5 to 11 year olds

Children aged 5 to 11 years who are in a clinical risk group or who live with someone who is immunosuppressed can get the COVID-19 vaccine, in line with advice set out by the <u>Joint Committee on</u> <u>Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI)</u>.

Eligible children include those with diabetes, immunosuppression, learning disabilities, and other conditions as outlined by the <u>UK Health Security</u> <u>Agency (UKHSA) in the Green Book</u>.

Further information is available in the <u>guide for</u> <u>parents of children aged 5 to 11 years</u> published by UKHSA. The Department of Education has published some <u>frequently asked questions</u> on the vaccination programme including information on eligibility, accessibility and advice for parents of children at high risk from COVID-19. Following <u>advice</u> from the JCVI, healthy 5 to 11 year old children will also be offered two 10 microgram doses of the COVID-19 vaccine. The NHS will prepare to extend this nonurgent offer to all children during April.

In maths Y1 have continued to work on addition and Y2 further subtraction and have explored multiplication and division. Most children have gone home with a new library book for the week. In English this week, the children have completed a grammar assessment, I was very pleased with



how well everyone did, and we have started on a journey along the river with Ratty and Mole form The Wind in the Willows by Kenneth Graham. We have started building a biography of Kenneth Graham and have discovered that he lived in a cottage next to St James' church in Pangbourne and he was originally buried in the graveyard there. In maths the cubes are continuing to explore dividing a 2-digit number by a 1-digit number progressing on to exchanging tens. The Spheres are exploring are of different shapes and if they are have diagonal lines this is proving trickier. Skeletons is the topic in science and we have started to create a life size skeleton of 5 of the children in class and discussed why we need one and how some animals don't have a skeleton and some have skeletons on the outside.
